

Phila. June 29 1875

My dear wife

Hazen has just handed me \$5 which he says the bank him - back dispossess of business fish. He got home all right seeming in excellent spirits - exhorting & encouraging Tom to go off where a bank too - but so far without success. We had a few drops of rain this morning early - just enough to cover the prairie sand with a coating $\frac{1}{10}$ or $\frac{1}{12}$ of an inch thick. It was a satisfaction however to find that it had not forgotten how to do it. I taught some more horse yesterday & we will drain the Schuykill "through Jonathan" before we give up the fight for the flowers. I had a note from Susan this morning telling how Elizabeth had written her that she had been ill since the 15th of June - I am

afraid this is a foremonition of the
way those young women are going to worry
each other as soon as E. gets home - She has
said rather it was or to Anne Westhorne
like that but as soon as she communicates
with Anna she exaggerates her ills.
She told her that she had just telegraphed
(August 9th) for a stateroom on the Majestic
for Oct 2^d. Possibly her difficulties in getting
passage home when she desired to have made
her feel more despondent than usual. Anna
says nothing about herself.

I also recd this morning thy letter & one
from Lillie - Lillie writes in excellent spirits
& says they continually use the Cyclopedias
& encyclopedias which are frequent. Frank
she says takes after her in her argumentative
habit & does not hesitate to open a combat
with "They thy papa, uncle Thomas, but I
think that is not so." She will have to
train him for a longer.
