## VIEW STANDARDS FOR UNITED ACTION

### Speakers Admit Need For Agreed Program

One of the liveliest Home and School meetings in recent years completely absorbed parents present in the high school auditorium despite the hard rain of Monday night. The announced topic of "Standards for Youth" is important to the entire community. That fact plus widely differing theories prevalent on the subject and its closeness to all present drew general audience participation.

Speakers for the evening whose consent to discuss so controversial a subject was proof both of their concern and their courage were the Rev. George Christian Anderson rector of Trinity Church, Hannah Kirk of the high school's English staff, and Mrs. John Jenny of its mathematics staff. Réverberations from their "no punches pulled" speeches have not yet quieted down.

Mr. Anderson's discourse which considered "What are desirable standards; how to instill in young people the desire to adhere to acceptable standards; what is the responsibility of parent, church, and school?" upheld the more conservative practice of obedience to authority against the free (and he felt locally prevailing) practice of self expression. "All you need to do is to go to the local drug store and see how many times you get shoved around by Swarthmore youngsters to realize that if manners are a virtue it has either been unheard of or forgotten in Swarthmore."

Children's behavior, he said, imitates that of their parents who are directly reflected in the carelessness, selfishness, laziness, lack of discipline, or virtue, of their children. Parents do not now agree as to what constitute standards even though they "materially assist in the creation of the child's pattern of behavior."

That fact plus widely differing theories prevalent on the subject and its closeness to all present drew general audience participation.

Speakers for the evening whose consent to discuss so controversial a subject was proof both of their concern and their courage were the Rev. George Christian Anderson rector of Trinity Church, Hannah Kirk of the high school's English staff, and Mrs. John Jenny of its mathematics staff. Reverberations from their "no punches pulled" speeches have not yet quieted down.

Mr. Anderson's discourse which considered "What are desirable standards; how to instill in young people the desire to adhere to acceptable standards; what is the responsibility of parent, church, and school?" upheld the more conservative practice of obedience to authority against the free (and he felt locally prevailing) practice of self expression. "All you need to do is to go to the local drug store and see how many times you get shoved around by Swarthmore youngsters to realize that if manners are a virtue it has either been unheard of or forgotten in Swarthmore."

Children's behavior, he said, imitates that of their parents who are directly reflected in the carelessness, selfishness, laziness, lack of discipline, or virtue, of their children. Parents do not now agree as to what constitute standards even though they "materially assist in the creation of the child's pattern of behavior."

**LAUNDRY TROUBLES**  
A/C Gordon Douglas writes from an undisclosed camp as follows: "The laundry service around here is really something! All our laundry is done at a nearby Army camp where they employ German war prisoners. Every once in a while one goes back his shirt with a awastika cut out of it, and they never send anything back that isn't strictly G. I. The only stuff one can make them replace is government issue clothing, so they keep everything else. The way they do the laundry beats all! They starch our underwear but leave our shirts and pants as limp as a dish rag. The prisoners must take great pride in aiding the German war effort by knocking all the buttons off our clothes, thus lowering our morale by making us sew them back. With the last bunch of laundry received in my room came innumerable broken buttons, so that the floor was covered with them."

**THE CHRISTMAS SPIRIT**  
Dear Editor:  
As the Christmas season approaches let us put into practice what we really believe. "It is better to give than to receive." It is the time for extra effort. It is the

"Blood donated only four days ago at a chain of Army blood banks stretching from San Francisco to New York will help save the lives of Americans who fall wounded along the Siegfried Line today. Shipments have been flown daily from the U. S. to ETO since Aug. 23, and the interval between donation in America and transfusion at the front is four days.

"These speedy delivery runs were inaugurated by Paul R. Huxley, ETO chief surgeon, at a Paris conference, as one of four reasons why present-day mortality from wounds is half the World War I figure. Then, eight out of every 100 wounded men died; now the figure is less than four out of every 100.

"The four factors contributing most to the halving of the death rate were listed as: (1) Earlier treatment by front-line surgeons; (2) the excellent physical condition—far superior to that of World War I doughboys—of U. S. troops; (3) use of plasma and whole blood; (4) use of anti-bacteria agents—sulfa drugs and penicillin.

"Col. Elliott C. Cutler, chief consultant in surgery, said surgery had been taken as close to the fighting front as humanly possible through highly-trained teams organized into platoons of field hospitals, placed at the level of a divisional clearing company.

"The greatest saving in lives in this war has been among men hit in the abdomen, chest and face, and among those sustaining multiple fractures," he said. "It's been made possible because surgeons have been able to see the casualties early, sometimes in two to four hours after they were hit."

"Mortality in the last war among men with stomach wounds was 80 percent—now it is 18 to 20 percent. "The daily delivery of blood in refrigerated trucks to front-line and evacuation hospitals he termed one of the greatest single improvements

over the medical technique of World War I. "It is now universally recognized," he said, "that when much blood has been lost the patient recovers only as it is replaced. For best results, a large proportion should be whole blood. "On the continent there are two sources of whole blood—donations from non-combatant troops, and blood drawn daily from the U. S. The Army Medical Division has a chain of blood banks across the U. S., and then to the Communications Zone or front-line hospitals. "Hawley said that blood donations, in the U. S. vary according to the war news, dropping, strangely when the news is good. After the fall of Paris donations back home took a sharp dive."

In the world of letters, he is renowned for his volume of poetry, "The Wings of Oppression" and his "L'Oratoire," a dramatic history in five parts.

## View Standards For United Action

The home, the church, and the school must have a common standard if confusion and conflict are to be avoided. The child finding the same standards stressed in all three will then recognize that they are essential to a well ordered life and make them a part of his own. Permitting a child to think he is free to run his own life the way he sees fit is not intelligent raising of children, he declared. Such a child is "headed for disaster."

In conclusion Mr. Anderson urged that parents make child training a full time job. "Although the mothers of past generations did not have books on child psychology—they had hours all day long with their children. I wonder whether or not our difficulty with modern youth is the result of substituting a book instead of hours."

Miss Kirk in discussing standards of the school admitted that Swarthmore children did "just give anything else than academic training. Its children work for marks and do only as much work as must be done to obtain grades. Their intelligence is superior and although they work as hard as in some other places local children should accomplish more with more work."

Other characteristics of local children Mrs. Jenny listed as possible of improvement were rationalization of everything, refusal to face the blame for misdeeds, a total lack of responsibility, a lack of politeness. She pleads for parental co-operation in helping Swarthmore children to develop their full capacities.

**YALE POSITION FOR BLANSHARD**

Philosophy Head to End 20-Year Service

Brand Blanshard, since 1925 a member of the Swarthmore College philosophy department and its chairman since 1930, will leave Swarthmore at the end of the current semester to accept an appointment as professor of philosophy at Yale University, New Haven, Conn.

After having studied at the University of Michigan, Columbia University, and as a Rhodes Scholar at the University of Oxford, and after having taught for four years at the University of Michigan, Professor Blanshard, in 1925, joined the Swarthmore College faculty. He has taught at Swarthmore continuously since his appointment except for a year as a Guggenheim fellow in Europe and a year as a visiting professor at Columbia.

Professor Blanshard is one of four contributors to Preface to Philosophy, soon to be published by the Armed Forces Institute. He has been president of the American Philosophical Association's Eastern Division since 1940, and last year served on its committee on philosophy in a liberal arts education.

Mrs. Blanshard, who has been Dean of Women at the College since 1928, has also decided to leave Swarthmore in order to complete a book on women's education.

Peter Murray son of the Fred Murrays of Yale avenue was the first local boy to hear the message and to inform the Davis'. This was followed by reports from 20 relay-listeners from all over the eastern part of the country, one as far away as Toronto, Canada.

On the heels of these came a message from the War Department on Thanksgiving Day morning which said the following evening propaganda broadcast from Germany had been intercepted: "Dearest Mother.—Am a prisoner of war in Germany, am wounded in right hand, but improving. Write to this address (Stalag, 7A, Germany). Send packages through Red Cross. Information can be obtained there. All previous mail will be returned. My love to you, Dad, and all. God bless you all. Love Dick."

**YALE POSITION FOR BLANSHARD**

Philosophy Head to End 20-Year Service

Brand Blanshard, since 1925 a member of the Swarthmore College philosophy department and its chairman since 1930, will leave Swarthmore at the end of the current semester to accept an appointment as professor of philosophy at Yale University, New Haven, Conn.

After having studied at the University of Michigan, Columbia University, and as a Rhodes Scholar at the University of Oxford, and after having taught for four years at the University of Michigan, Professor Blanshard, in 1925, joined the Swarthmore College faculty. He has taught at Swarthmore continuously since his appointment except for a year as a Guggenheim fellow in Europe and a year as a visiting professor at Columbia.

Professor Blanshard is one of four contributors to Preface to Philosophy, soon to be published by the Armed Forces Institute. He has been president of the American Philosophical Association's Eastern Division since 1940, and last year served on its committee on philosophy in a liberal arts education.

Mrs. Blanshard, who has been Dean of Women at the College since 1928, has also decided to leave Swarthmore in order to complete a book on women's education.

On Tuesday evening, November 21 when Prisoners of War messages were broadcast over short wave from Berlin and "picked up" here by relay-listeners, Mr. and Mrs. Clark W. Davis of Wallingford were the happy recipients of good news from their son, Dick whom they knew to be a prisoner of war in Germany.

Peter Murray son of the Fred Murrays of Yale avenue was the first local boy to hear the message and to inform the Davis'. This was followed by reports from 20 relay-listeners from all over the eastern part of the country, one as far away as Toronto, Canada.

On the heels of these came a message from the War Department on Thanksgiving Day morning which said the following evening propaganda broadcast from Germany had been intercepted: "Dearest Mother.—Am a prisoner of war in Germany, am wounded in right hand, but improving. Write to this address (Stalag, 7A, Germany). Send packages through Red Cross. Information can be obtained there. All previous mail will be returned. My love to you, Dad, and all. God bless you all. Love Dick."

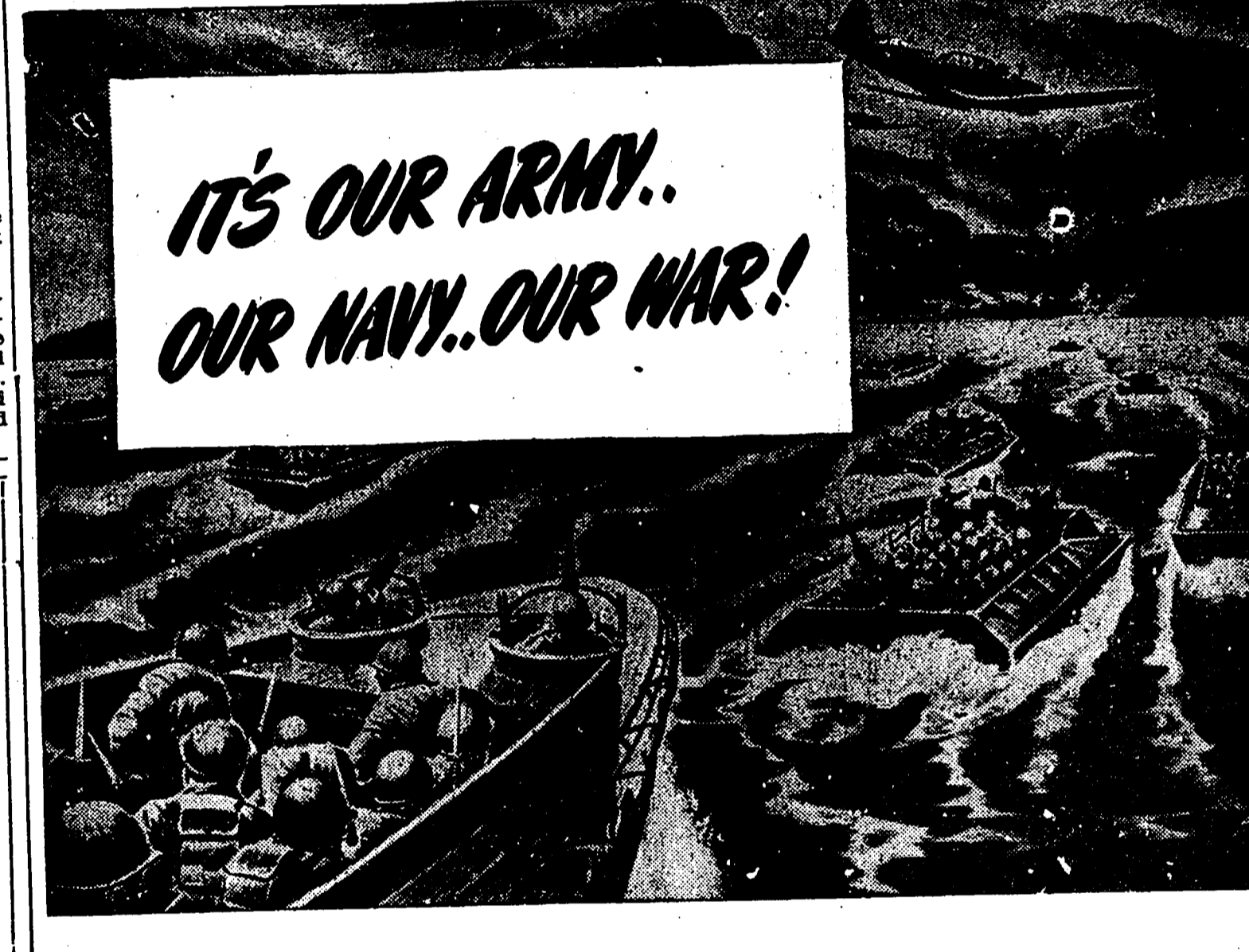

JOHNSON HEADS COLLEGE BOARD

Aydelotte Becomes Board Member In Election

Howard Cooper Johnson, vice president of Strawbridge and Clothier, of Philadelphia, was elected president of the Board of Managers of Swarthmore College at its annual meeting Tuesday. Mr. Johnson has served as a member of the Board for 48 years, and has been its vice president since 1932.

His election followed the resignation of Charles Francis Jenkins, publisher of the Farm Journal who has been a member of the Board since 1904, and its president since 1932. Another valued member, Henry C. Turner of the Turners construction Company, resigned today ending a term of service which began in 1912.

At the same time the Board announced the election of two new members, Frank Aydelotte son of Princeton, N. J., for 19 years president of Swarthmore College, and Edmund G. Robinson, of Wilmington, Del., a member of the Class of 1905 and nominated by the Alumni Association.

Dr. Aydelotte, newly elected member of the Board, re-establishes his connection with Swarthmore College which began when he became President in 1921, and was interrupted when he resigned in 1940 to become Director of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton.

Dr. Aydelotte has an international reputation in higher education. A Rhodes Scholar himself, he has been American secretary to the Rhodes Trustees since 1918. As chairman of the advisory board of the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation since 1925, he has been privileged to select many promising scholars and artists for Fellowships in Europe.

During his 19 years at Swarthmore, Dr. Aydelotte introduced a method of teaching exceptionally able students known as "honors work," and raised the endowment of the college from three million dollars to eight million dollars.

TO CONDUCT UKRAINIAN SERVICE

A special liturgical service of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church (Eastern Catholic Rites) will be held Sunday evening at 6 o'clock at the Trinity Church. Father Omelian Mykola will preside at the service, which will be sung in the Ukrainian language.

The Lisanko Choir, consisting of a group of Ukrainian girls, will be present in their peasant costumes to sing the ancient chants. The Liturgy will include Caryou Nebosny (Prayers to the Holy Ghost); Nachal Oblazne (Preparation Prayer); 103rd Psalm; Yellkaya Ektentya (The Great Litany with Halleluiah); The First Psalm (four tones); Ektentya Blahaina (Supplicating Litany with Special Prayers for men and women in the service); Peool Tzoyou Nllest (Supplication to the Virgin Mary); and the Dead.

The church will be illumined by candle light following the Greek tradition. After the service there will be folk dancing and songs in the recreation room of the church. A religious procession will precede the service. The public is cordially invited to attend.

### MERYWEATHER CITED FOR BRAVERY

#### Citation, Letter Give Details to Parents

The Rev. and Mrs. Thomas A. Meryweather of Haverford place have received a copy of the official citation which accompanied the presentation of the Bronze Star medal to their son Pfc. T. Arthur Meryweather, Jr. The presentation was made in France on July 4. The citation is as follows:

"For heroic action: On 14th of June, 1944, the light machine gun section of Company K, 39th Infantry, of which Pfc. Meryweather was a member, was on the south side of... France, badly needed by... Platoon of Company K, 39th Infantry, located on the... side of town. Due to the nature of the terrain and to the tactical situation the only route of approach that they could use to reach the desired location in time to accomplish their mission, entailed crossing street 20 feet wide which was under fire from enemy machine guns that were in steel pillboxes at a range of about 150 yards. These guns had been firing at anything that approached this particular street. Pfc. Meryweather was subjected to the direct enemy machine gun fire, but proceeded to his appointed position and accomplished his mission."

In a letter from this soldier, in which he describes this action, he stated: "Somehow we went through or under the machine gun fire coming down the street. Two men were killed but we finally got through and cleaned up the town and captured about 265 Germans. It was in this action that a sniper hit my pistol. It ruined my pistol but saved my life."

The injury for which Arthur Meryweather received the Purple Heart medal occurred late in July. Since that time he has been in several hospitals in France and England.

In the first World War Rev. Meryweather, while fighting in France in an infantry regiment of the 28th Division, was struck by an enemy bullet which was deflected by the pistol clip he was wearing on his belt.

Coach Dellmuth said, "I cannot impress upon you too much the necessity of a mental and physical fitness program in the school from the start in preparation for any military program and neither can I be too emphatic in urging everyone to give their earnest thought to any suggested compulsory military training. It is for us to think this thing out for the best interests of the nation."

Rev. David Braun, pastor of the Presbyterian Church who served as master of ceremonies introduced the other speakers of the evening who included: G. Baker, Thompson principal, C. MacDonald, Swan chairman of the Citizens' Committee which promoted the affair, William C. F. "Bill" Ziegenfus, football coach, Henry Hoffman, J.V. coach, George Reimer head of the various junior high programs, and Fred C. Underhill, president of the Lansdowne School Board.

A varied and interesting program included the presentation of silver footballs to the lettermen, the introduction of the coaches of the teams that Swarthmore played on the gridiron during the year, and the introduction of outstanding opponents who were chosen by the Swarthmore team. The affair was concluded by the showing of motion pictures of the year's leading football games. Of special interest were the shots of this year's Penn-Army game. Bob Garner, Swarthmore's High Graduate and a former faculty member and coach at the school showed the film.

coat-of-arms indicates the union of two great English speaking countries of the world, and the bond between the Anglican church and the Episcopal church. In the lancet window to the right of the figure of St. George, there is a medallion depicting the Good Samaritan. This symbolizes the need of world brotherhood—one of the ideals for which the present war is being fought. The medallion is an exact reproduction of a European window and is executed in the technique of the 14th century. The figures appear against a blue background.

In the lancet to the left of the central figure is another medallion depicting Daniel in the Lion's Den—symbol of courage based on God. This symbol is particularly appropriate to indicate the courage of our service men. The medallion is of the same origin as the Good Samaritan medallion and has been executed in the same technique. Beneath the Good Samaritan appears a small reproduction of a

medallion found in Le Mans Cathedral. It shows Christianity as a Queen with a flag of victory. The same theme is found in Bourges Cathedral.

Below the Daniel medallion, the artists have reproduced another beautiful scene showing the blindness toward Christianity—a female figure with a bandage above her eyes and a crown tumbling from her head. This illustrates the threat to Christianity which was posed at the beginning of the present World War, and the symbol of victory in the panel to the left it symbolizes the triumph of Christian ideals over paganism. All of the scenes are on backgrounds of great beauty and dark rich colors are employed throughout. Those who have seen the window acclaim it as one of the finest of its type in this country. The public is cordially invited to the dedication.

So many years since then and still men of goodwill with all their striving seem as far away from peace on earth as they did when the star shone over the stable in quiet Bethlehem.

But was the night quiet in Bethlehem? We read of shepherds startled from their sleep by the angels' carol and we think with longing of the quietude of the sheepboy. We sing "O Little Town of Bethlehem, How Still We See Thee Lie" but Bethlehem did not lie still on that wondrous night. That is why—in the midst of holiday fun—the bravery with which service families go quietly about their daily living is some thing of which each of us is really aware. That is why back of every little thing we do here at home there is the humility and gratitude and love for all Swarthmore's sons and daughters who fight to earn the peace.

And so, because of Christmas we go beyond the traditional greeting of Tiny Tim's, though Heaven knows we need the blessing, and say—each one of us to each one of you—"Go with God."

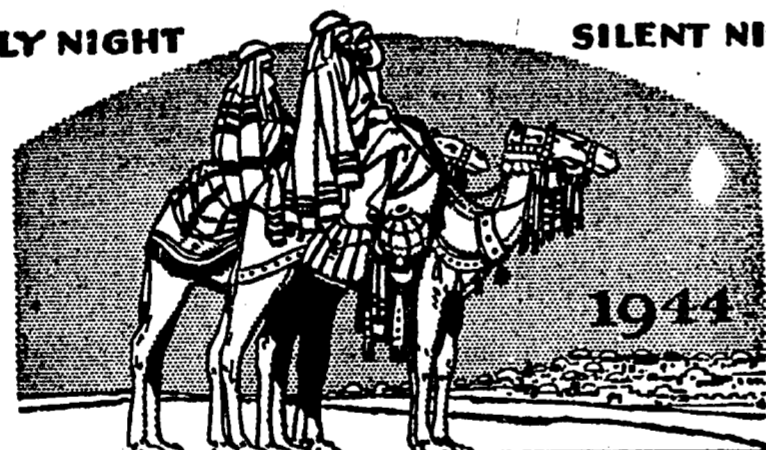

However, interest was so great that the orchestra has grown into its present size of approximately 25 pieces.

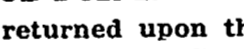
Last Chance, Girls

verbal and non-verbal, determine intelligence quotients, diagnostic tests help in adjustments (in this area the school wishes to do more) specific aptitude tests search out individual skills and interests, occupational interest inventories provide further information, personality, and prognostic tests furnish valuable understanding. All are matched together since to rely on any one is impossible since every measure has some percentage of error.

James D. Miller appealed to mothers for constructive criticism and asked their cooperation in keeping children from crossing the railroad tracks before a serious accident occurred. The crossing which is customary instead of following the safe underpass route is in violation of railroad orders and extremely dangerous. "Fundamentally education goes on all the time and we must work together on this as a mutual problem."

Prior to the program at the business meeting with Mrs. Campbell presiding mothers agreed that 10 p.m. was a reasonable hour to expect children home after an evening event and that they would work toward achieving it; that the Home and School Parents' night at school was valuable but needed some improvement in its mechanics.

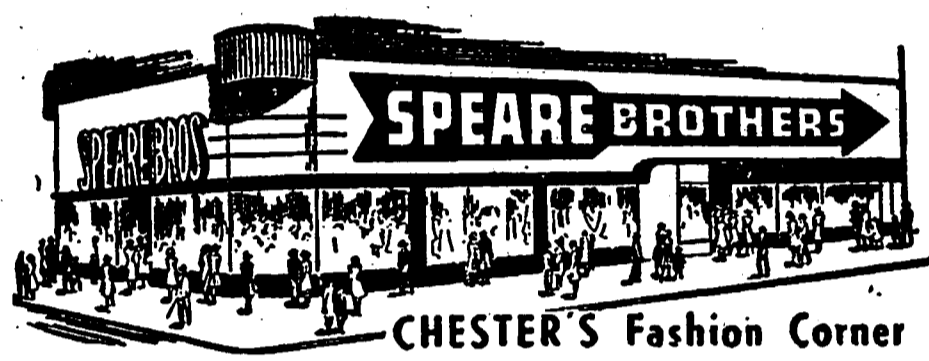
