URGE VOTE ON LIQUOR SALE

Burgess Seeks True Poll Of Borough's Wishes

Burgess J. Paul Brown of Walnut lane has issued the following letter to Swarthmore business institutions, churches, schools, social and service clubs:

"On Tuesday, September 13th, the following questions will appear on the voting machines in Swarthmore:

"Do you favor granting liquor licenses for the sale of liquor in the Borough of Swarthmore?

"Do you favor the granting of malt and brewed beverage retail dispenser license for consumtion on premises where sold in the Borough of Swarthmore?

"Many citizens of the Borough are rightly concerned over the outcome of this vote.

"Earlier this summer, through the leadership of George McKeag it was possible to secure petitions signed by more than 700 Swarthmore voters which guaranteed the inclusion of these two questions on our ballot in Septem-

"I have been asked to call together a representative from each institution in the Borough to meet with George McKeag for the purpose of organizing a committee to insure that a majority of Swarthmore voters go to the polls on September 13th and vote NO to this question of the sale of liquor or malt beverages in the village.

"The meeting will take place in Council Chambers, Borough Hall, Swarthmore on Monday evening, August 8th at 7:45 p.m.

"Will you please come, yourself, resentative of your crganization to this meeting."

Willard Tomlinson's Plan For Better Swarthmore Large corporations offer hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarships annually for advanced scientific study in the physical sciences. The government gives many millions of dollars to 65 universities for military research. It seems almost as though the perverted form of the 23rd Psalm had come true: "Science is my shepherd, I shall not want . . . and I shall dwell in the house of science forever."

But are we more able to say that we fear no evil than a hundred years ago? We repeat the Lord's prayer, but do we put our trust in His Kingdom coming? We trust only our own kingdom of reeking tube and iron shard. The heavens declare the glory of science but the earth proclaims the downfall of man.

Brains have accomplished so much in a material sense. Can we not make use of science to help us solve the greatest of all human problems? Is the scientific method confined to the test tube and the proving ground or does it offer a ray of hope for the average man and his wife the world over?

Strange as it may seem, many eminent Americans answer this question in the affirmative. In his latest book, "The Proper Study of Mankind," Stuart Chase writes: "If war is to go, it is probable that only the scientific method can hasten its going." Kurt Lewin, M. I. T. social psychologist, wrote just before his untimely death: "I am convinced that it is possible to undertake experiments in sociology which have as much right to be called scientific as those in physics and chemistry." President Conant of Harvard, writes: "It is my belief that methods have already developed to a point where studies of society can provide basic information to all those practical men who struggle with human relations." Stuart Chase, turning from his first love of economics, has drawn up a 5-point program for human progress with includes these steps:

- 1. A gigantic plan for permanent peace under international
- 2. More team-work in the scientific disciplines.
- 3. The all-out encouragement of more talented young people to make social science their life work.
- 4. More funds for social science studies.
- More public support. Every man and his wife should begin to feel in their bones that here is the one best hope for survival.

As Mr. Chase knows, it is difficult to guide young people into the life sciences. The writer has tried to enlighten hundreds of young people, only to have a practical parent or teacher divert them to chemistry, physics or cybernetics.



The great corporations would probably not be too interested. It seems unlikely that an overburdened national government would respond to such an appeal. But how about our churches? Can we look to them for aid?


Toward a Swarthmore Plan

Would Swarthmore church members give a dollar a year for scholarship to a local girl or boy for social research on the postgraduate level? With such a fund, we could support one of our native sons who wants to work in social science or in religion. The whole community could watch his progress, take pride in his accomplishments, whether in banishing local prejudice, in avoiding a strike on the industrial scene or in promoting understanding between East and the West. Six such Swarthmore Plans (Media, Lansdowne, Haverford, Upper Darby, Merion and Drexel Hill) could support a team of social scientists working on the most important problem of the day. A thousand such communities might develop a trailblazer who could equal a Newton. Five thousands Swarthmore Plans might produce a Darwin, while fifteen thousand neighborhood church units might push up an Einstein. 



How can we encourage more SWARTHMORE young people to at Ashland. Pa. dedicate their studies and their lives to the problem of human relations at home and abroad? Active workers will continue to go into the American Friends Service Committee and simular missions. But how about the necessary original thinkers, the researchers? How can we cultivate a Newton, a Darwin and an Einstein in Social science?

The great corporations would probably not be too interested. It seems unlikely that an overburdened national government would respond to such an appeal. But how about our churches? Can we look to them for aid?

Toward a Swarthmore Plan

Would Swarthmore church members give a dollar a year for a scholarship to a local girl or boy for social research on the postgraduate level? With such a fund, we could support one of our native sons who wants to work in social science or in religion. The whole community could watch his progress, take pride in his accomplishments, whether in banishing local prejudice, in avoiding a strike on the industrial scene or in promoting understanding between East and the West. Six such Swarthmore Plans (Media. Lansdowne. Haverford, Upper Darby, Merion and Drexel Hill) could support a team of social scientists working on the most important problem of the day. A thousand such communities might develop a trailblazer who could equal a Newton. Five thousands Swarthmore Plans might produce a Darwin, while fifteen thousand neighborhood church units might push up an Einstein. Banded together, these pioneers in human relations could lead the children of the atomic age out of a frightening wilderness.

Boro Professor Writes New Text On

Theatre

One of the latest additions to the non-fiction shelves of the Swarthmore Public Library is "The Art of Acting", being the second definitive work on the theatre written by the well-known educator and theatrical authority John Dolman, Jr. of Vassar av-

enue, and recently released by Harper and Brothers, publishers. The new 313-page volume is a companion book to "The Art of Play Production which was published in 1928 and revised in 1946 by the University of Pennsylvania professor of English and stands an acknowledged classic for play production students, an influential

technique of dramatic art. Professor Dolman was born to the theatre and has lived theatre all his life. His new book is dedicated to Elizabeth Jane Phillips (Mrs. John Nickerson) who "in many parts and played them well' but was only one of three wellknown professional actors in the author's grand parentage. John Nickerson was the actor-manager credited with raising stage direction to an art and profession and in his later years was considered the national arbiter of staging technique and taste. John Dolman.Sr. the paternal grandparent played in the old Arch street theatre. Philadelphia back in the 1850's and 60's before becoming a famous . lawyer.

for which the earlier volume is noted "The Art of Acting" is, "for the beginner, but not the dabbler. It presupposes no stage experience or previous instruction in acting. but it does presuppose an inquiring mind, some degree of literacy, and some such maturity of attitude as might reasonably be expected of students in college, or of those more numerous students, who lacking the opportunity for academic study, are trying to arrive at equally good results by reading and thinking for themselves.' 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

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
