BORO FATHERS IN SUMMER SESSION

Traffic Light, Rent
Control, Sewer
On Agenda

At Monday evening's meeting of Borough Council, Springfield Township agreed to share the expense of installing and maintaining a traffic light at Baltimore pike and Sproul road, equally with this borough.

Allan C. Wood, Swarthmore avenue apartment house owner, and Attorney Charles T. Larkin petitioned the borough fathers to hold a public hearing on the abolition of rent control. Council postponed setting date for such a hearing until its September session, planning meanwhile to determine whether the citizenry in general desired such a hearing.

It was decided to advertise for bids on the installation of a sanitary sewer on Rutgers avenue between Yale and Westdale avenues.

Willard Tomlinson's Plan For Better Swarthmore

Large corporations offer hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarships annually for advanced scientific study in the physical sciences. The government gives many millions of dollars to 65 universities for military research. It seems almost as though the perverted form of the 23rd Psalm had come true: "Science is my shepherd, I shall not want . . . and I shall dwell in the house of science forever."

But are we more able to say that we fear no evil than a hundred years ago? We repeat the Lord's prayer, but do we put our trust in His Kingdom coming? We trust only our own kingdom of reeking tube and iron shard. The heavens declare the glory of science but the earth proclaims the downfall of man.

Brains have accomplished so much in a material sense. Can we not make use of science to help us solve the greatest of all human problems? Is the scientific method confined to the test tube and the proving ground or does it offer a ray of hope for the average man and his wife the world over?

Strange as it may seem, many eminent Americans answer this question in the affirmative. In his latest book, "The Proper Study of Mankind," Stuart Chase writes: "If war is to go, it is probable that only the scientific method can hasten its going." Kurt Lewin, M. I. T. social psychologist, wrote just before his untimely death: "I am convinced that it is possible to undertake experiments in sociology which have as much right to be called scientific as those in physics and chemistry." President Conant of Harvard, writes: "It is my belief that methods have already developed to a point where studies of society can provide basic information to all those practical men who struggle with human relations." Stuart Chase, turning from his first love of economics, has drawn up a 5-point program for human progress with includes these steps:

1. A gigantic plan for permanent peace under international agency.
2. More team-work in the scientific disciplines.
3. The all-out encouragement of more talented young people to make social science their life work.
4. More funds for social science studies.
5. More public support. Every man and his wife should begin to feel in their bones that here is the one best hope for survival.

As Mr. Chase knows, it is difficult to guide young people into the life sciences. The writer has tried to enlighten hundreds of young people, only to have a practical parent or teacher divert them to chemistry, physics or cybernetics.

URGE VOTE ON LIQUOR SALE

Burgess Seeks True
Poll Of Borough's
Wishes

Burgess J. Paul Brown of Walnut lane has issued the following letter to Swarthmore business institutions, churches, schools, social and service clubs:

"On Tuesday, September 13th, the following questions will appear on the voting machines in Swarthmore:

"Do you favor granting liquor licenses for the sale of liquor in the Borough of Swarthmore?"

"Do you favor the granting of malt and brewed beverage retail dispenser license for consumption on premises where sold in the Borough of Swarthmore?"

"Many citizens of the Borough are rightly concerned over the outcome of this vote.

"Earlier this summer, through the leadership of George McKeag it was possible to secure petitions signed by more than 700 Swarthmore voters which guaranteed the inclusion of these two questions on our ballot in September.

"I have been asked to call together a representative from each institution in the Borough to meet with George McKeag for the purpose of organizing a committee to insure that a majority of Swarthmore voters go to the polls on September 13th and vote NO to this question of the sale of liquor or malt beverages in the village.

"The meeting will take place in Council Chambers, Borough Hall, Swarthmore on Monday evening, August 8th at 7:45 p.m.

"Will you please come, yourself, or send a very responsible representative of your organization to this meeting."

WHI Churches Work Together

Maybe our churches are too busy to undertake such a project. They have mortgages to carry, new buildings to erect, and higher salaries to pay. Such burdens may prevent them from seeing the light that Stuart Chase, Kurt Lewin and James Conant have glimpsed. Maybe we shall have to look to non-church members to save humanity! But what a step forward if Catholics, Episcopalians, Presbyterians, Methodists, Christian Scientists and Quakers would all work together in a project engineered to construct the Kingdom of God right here in Swarthmore?

The dollar-a-year-a-member idea may have merit. It would put everyone young and old, into the crusade. At the same time, a professional campaign might be started to raise larger sums from men of good will who have a financial stake in survival.

If this two-headed drive should catch fire, then we could devote half the total sum raised to a graduate scholarship for a Swarthmore for improving our corner of the world, so that this may be a better boy in social science. The other half of the money could be used place to live, worship and have children. Teams of concerned citizens would find in this project an outlet for their extra energies and their Christian love. All church people in town should join forces. Some members would be assigned to assist overworked mothers. Some would aid teachers and pupils who clash. Others could assist workers and employers to iron out hostile feelings. Still others would write their friends and relatives abroad telling about the Swarthmore Plan and how it might work there. In this way, we would accomplish two all-important objectives:

1. We would stimulate fundamental research in how to resolve problems of greed, revenge and infatuation.
2. We would start to make America the America of our dreams, instead of what she seems.

Divine Aid Imperative

We must remember to include the religious, the spiritual leader in our working teams of social scientists. Man alone, even scientific man, can never solve this age-old problem. But with prayer for God's creative spirit, with earnest and humble soul-searching, all things are possible. There is really no need for so many good people to feel frustrated. We can start right here at home to save the world. And a people that can create the atom bomb so quickly, can tackle any problem with confidence. Yes, we may fail, but if we have as much courage as the early Christians and the saints of the middle ages we need fear no evil.

A united program of working together in our home neighborhood, aided by fundamental research and foreign service—these should give us that zest, that radiant glow, that sense of high adventure which Rufus Jones and Elton Truettblood feel to be so essential. Communism brute power, organized lovelessness must be overcome by a higher power, a truer religion. If enough people believe and (continued on page six)

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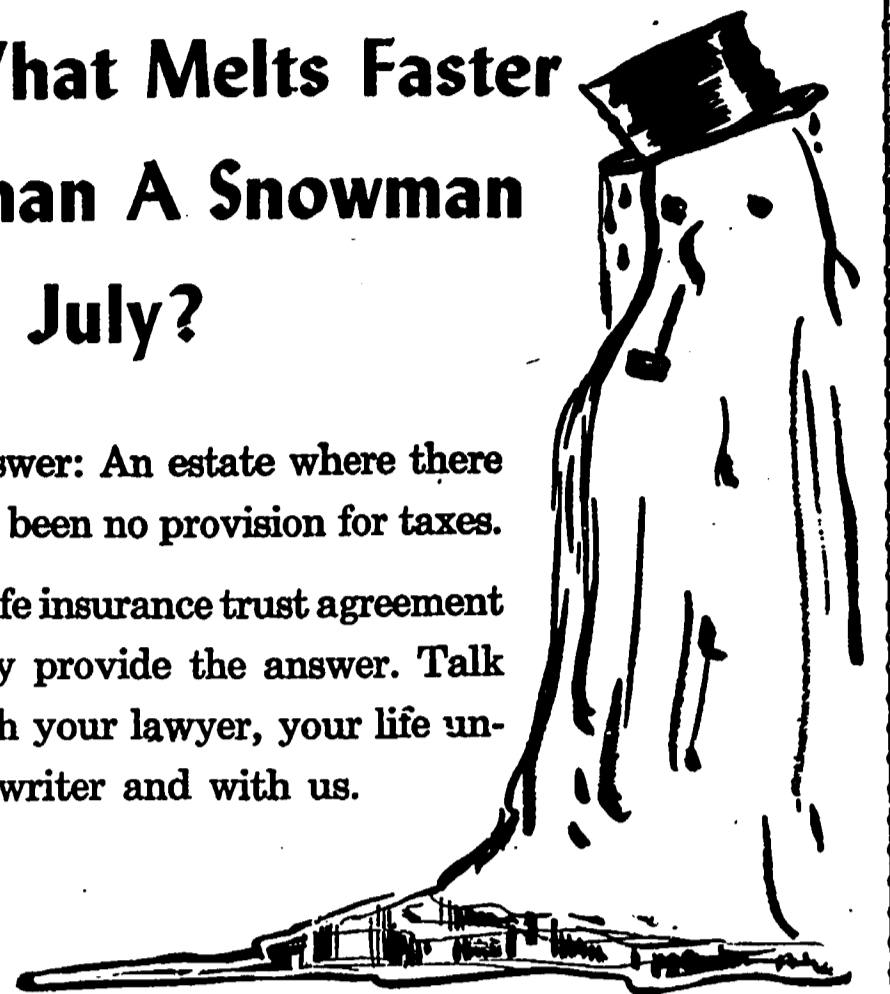
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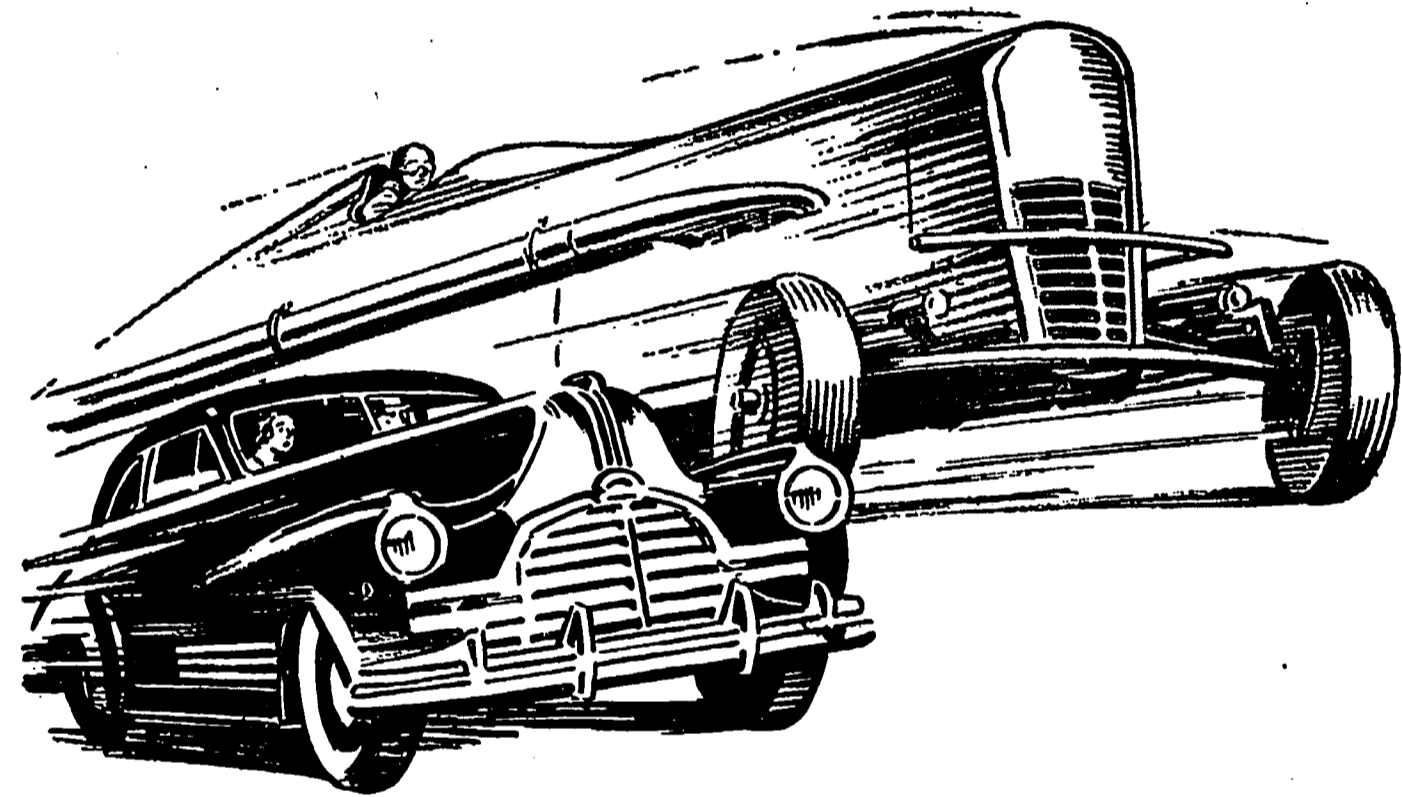

Maybe our churches are too busy to undertake such a project. They have mortgages to carry, new buildings to erect and higher salaries to pay. Such burdens may prevent them from seeing the light that Stuart Chase, Kurt Lewin and James Conant have glimpsed. Maybe we shall have to look to non-church members to save humanity! But what a step forward if Catholics, Episcopalians, Presbyterians, Methodists, Christian Scientists and Quakers would all work together in a project engineered to construct the Kingdom of God right here in Swarthmore?

The dollar-a-year-a-member idea may have merit. It would put everyone young and old, into the crusade. At the same time, a professional campaign might be started to raise larger sums from men of good will who have a financial stake in survival.

If this two-headed drive should catch fire, then we could devote half the total sum raised to a graduate scholarship for a Swarthmore boy in social science. The other half of the money could be used place to live, worship and have children. Teams of concerned citizens would find in this project an outlet for their extra energies and their Christian love. All church people in town should join forces. Some members would be assigned to assist overworked mothers. Some would aid teachers and pupils who clash. Others could assist workers and employers to iron out hostile feelings. Still others would write their friends and relatives abroad telling about the Swarthmore Plan and how it might work there. In this way, we would accomplish two all-important objectives:

1. We would stimulate fundamental research in how to resolve problems of greed, revenge and infatuation.
2. We would start to make America the America of our dreams, instead of what she seems.

Divine Aid Imperative
We must remember to include the religious, the spiritual leader in our working teams of social scientists. Man alone, even scientific man, can never solve this age-old problem. But with prayer for God's creative spirit, with earnest and humble soul-searching, all things are possible. There is really no need for so many good people to feel frustrated. We can start right here at home to save the world. And a people that can create the atom bomb so quickly, can tackle any problem with confidence. Yes, we may fail, but if we have as much courage as the early Christians and the saints of the middle ages we need fear no evil.
A united program of working together in our home neighborhood, aided by fundamental research and foreign service—these should give us that zest, that radiant glow, that sense of high adventure which Rufus Jones and Elton Truettblood feel to be so essential. Communism brute power, organized lovelessness must be overcome by a higher power, a truer religion. If enough people believe and (continued on page six)

HEARING HELD ON POOL PROJECT

Springfield Decision Withheld Tuesday Night

A number of interested residents of the southern end of Swarthmore joined citizens of the adjoining section of Springfield Township Tuesday evening in airing their views on the possible establishment of a restaurant and outdoor swimming club in connection with Theatre Square on South Chester road just below Fairview road.

Paul J. Carey of North Chester road speaking for Rupaca, Inc. petitioner for the zoning exception necessary for such a step, opened the meeting in the Springfield Township Building with an outline of his plans which include turning the dwelling next to the newly erected theatre and business houses, into a restaurant and constructing a pool toward the rear of the intervening property. He said it was his idea to create the pool along the lines recently attempted by a group of Swarthmore citizens who failed to raise the required number of advance memberships to finance such a community venture. About 150 charter memberships at \$200 each and annual memberships of \$50 are estimated requirements.

David Rumsey who was recently granted an exception to the Springfield Zoning Ordinance to build a garage to the south of the dwelling in question spoke in favor of the Rupaca petition. Mrs. W. C. Allen whose property adjoins Rupaca's made unofficial remarks in favor of the project and the Kinders who live between there and the S. Milton Bryant property at the Sprout Viaduct boundary of the Township, also are on record as feeling a restaurant and pool would be a desirable community adjunct and further develop the satisfactory existing business area. William Morrow, of Harvard avenue, owner of the Morrow Quarries at South Chester road and the Viaduct had expressed his agreement to the project by letter as also had the operator of the Quarries. Springfield Township along Chester road is zoned for business almost to the Allen property but the statute permits only offices, banks, and retail stores so that any other uses require special exceptions.

Although the opposition to a restaurant as proposed was not as strong there was definite objection to the pool part of the petition. Borough Secretary Elliott Richardson representing Swarthmore Borough Council asked members of the Board of Adjustment to consider carefully the parking problem, stating that the overflow from present facilities spilled over into broad streets (University place, Fairview road and Cornell avenue) even now when there was a popular moving picture at the theatre, and that increased attractions in the area would certainly add to this situation. He also stated that Swarthmore would object to the restaurant if a liquor or malt beverage license was to be sought in connection with it.

William Gehring, chairman of the public safety committee of Council, spoke as a resident of University place opposing the petition as also did several other nearby Swarthmore citizens. Mr. (continued on page six)

Are You Losing Social Security

Any person of 65 or over and not working, should get in touch with The Social Security Office, 302 Crozer Building, 5th and Market Streets, Chester, or telephone Chester 3-5508 to find out whether or not they are eligible for monthly old-age benefits. Herbert W. Gruber manager of the local office states that many have lost benefits because they neglected to ask about them, and asks that Social Security numbers be furnished with all requests.

A recent survey conducted by Gruber's office shows the following as the principal reasons people lose benefits:

(a) Think they did not work long enough, thus fail to get correct information.

(b) Think they have to be in need, which is not correct.

(c) Do not realize they can collect unemployment compensation and old age benefits at the same time.

(d) Were working for their children, some branch of Government, church or for themselves. Such employment is not covered by Social Security.

THE PORT KENNEDY BONE HOLE
No. 7 in the series "Your Historical Heritage." Watch for the next in an early issue of this paper.

Bryant was among the protesters from the immediate Springfield township area who feared objectionable noise and lights arising from such a project. The plans included being open evenings.

It was also brought out that though the pool is contemplated on a private club basis and might well work out on that system during the present economic state, more stringent times might drastically change the situation and once the pool was there it would be difficult if not impossible to prevent its becoming a public pool drawing uncontrolled crowds from entirely outside this area. Thus future generations might find themselves confronted with a considerable nuisance no matter how to the contrary the original establishments of the pool may have intended it.

A spokesman for a Springfield organization stated his group neither objected or approved of granting Rupaca the zoning exception it seeks, but desired to bring to the attention of the Board the various problems involved, as given above.

Mr. Carey did not seem insistent on the pool being included in the petition, if people did not desire it.

It is the custom of the Board to wait until the notes of such hearings, taken by a court stenographer, are transcribed and then to study them before announcing its decision. Therefore, at The Swarthmorean's press-time the outcome of the hearing was not known.

**CURRAN TAKES
OATH OF OFFICE**

Thomas A. Curran, inducted as Register of Wills and Clerk of Orphans' Court on August 10—just four days after his 49th birthday—is the unopposed Republican candidate for that row office at the September 13th Primary Election.

"I hope to continue to provide the services of this office with the same dignity and model efficiency of my predecessor, Judge Brethrick," Curran said, after taking his oath in the flower bedecked court room, "and thus play a part in continuing the Republican tradition of good government in Delaware County."

**SURE IT'S BEEN HOT, BUT SUPPOSE
YOU WERE USED TO 50 BELOW**

Borough canines had better look to their laurels (or whatever other shrub they prefer) for there's a newcomer in their midst who is stirring interest even in this town of varied purebreds and pure vari-breds.

Harking from the country of Jack London's "Call of the Wild," possibly a real descendant of "White Fang," the Alaskan husky of Dr. Harold Erikson, research associate in physiology at the Martin Laboratory, finds life at Swarthmore College in mid-summer a far cry from pulling sleds north of the Yukon. Accustomed to a temperature often 50 below zero the animal promptly indulged in the first coat shedding of his life when he arrived here late in June. His long white hair will most likely grow bushier again with winter weather.

Pretty Boy as he is called was adopted by the former University of Ohio anatomy professor at Alaska's northernmost tip, Point Barrow where the dog was born 2 1/2 years ago. Dr. Erikson, who came to Swarthmore College in 1947, left in July 1948 with Dr. Laurence Irving's second expedition to Alaska to study the adaptation of animals to cold climate, on behalf of the college and the Office of Naval Research. Pretty Boy's accompanying Dr. Erikson home seems to have thrown the study somewhat into reverse.

The dog amazes Erikson with his calm, quiet, phlegmatic manner; his pronounced friendliness and the way he acclimates himself and accepts change especially in view of his former reputation of being the most vicious of a notoriously surly strain of dogs. His only allergy seems to be crates. It took him less than five minutes to chew his way out of the sturdy case in which he'd been placed for air shipment to Seattle. Thereafter he rode contentedly with Dr. Erikson who happily was traveling on the same plane. From Seattle he followed his new master by train, a chain replacing the indignity of the crate.

Dr. Erikson believes the change in the dog's disposition is greatly due to environment. Pretty Boy was 18 months old when he first met Dr. Erikson. Eskimos are not usually sentimental about dogs. Hard work and having to work one's subsistence from any available garbage could easily account for native dogs being wary of mankind and generally more akin to the wild than to the highly domesticated and often pampered pooch America knows.

A little touch of Dr. Erikson's Norwegian charm, coupled with treats of meat gained Pretty Boy's devotion to the professor who then harness trained the former stray to pull him on skis along the snow trails. Aside from the fact that dogs notably reflect their master's personalities, what dog wouldn't respond favorably to loving, individual care including a three-pound daily provision of horse meat?

Dr. Erikson's neighbors in the College apartment house at 805 Harvard avenue, and members of the community who see Pretty Boy with his master in the bank or drug store think twice before patting the dog without formal introduction. They are agreeably surprised to discover his unassuming friendliness with men, women and children. When we entered the laboratory to talk with Dr. Erikson, Pretty Boy arose and came to greet us, then comfortably

**SCHOOL BEGINS
IN TWO WEEKS**

**New Pupils Must Be
Registered By
Sept. 2**

Swarthmore Public Schools will reopen on Monday morning, September 12, for all classes from kindergarten through the senior high school. During the first few days the elementary grades will have morning sessions only to acclimate the children gradually to the routine and confinement of school work. The teachers will assemble on September 7 for three days of conferences and workshop preparation for the year's work.

Registration for admission to school must be completed in the school office in the high school building on College avenue prior to September 2. The office is now open from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily for this purpose. All children entering Swarthmore Schools for the first time, including those in kindergarten, must be registered by their parents during the above hours. It is not necessary for children who were previously in the Swarthmore grades to register.

All pupils registering should bring with them vaccination and birth certificates and if entering from another school their transcript papers. New high school pupils should complete their roster of subjects by September 2.

School children should be taken to the family physician and a thorough health check-up before school, according to a recent announcement of school health officials in the city papers. Such examinations are urged for Swarthmore children so that any remediable defects may be corrected before the children resume classes at school.

In general the dividing line for grade pupils will begin at the railroad station, down Park Avenue to Harvard, and on Harvard to Crest Lane and Swarthmore avenue. Some exceptions must be made this year due to the fact that in the intermediate grades the classes at College Avenue are unusually large and that some pupils will be asked to go to Rutgers Avenue. In the first and second grades an additional class is being set up so that some of the pupils from the Rutgers Avenue School are being transferred to the College Avenue School to attend this additional class in accordance with the annual custom, therefore, it has been necessary to re-assign some of the pupils living near the line.

The hours of the daily school sessions are as follows: High School, morning 8:30 to 12; afternoon 12:50 to 3:15. Elementary grades, mornings 9 to 11:40; afternoon 1 to 3:15. Dismissal in the grades will be staggered, the smaller children who are inclined to loiter along the way being excused first, the older ones later.

The school calendar for the coming year includes the following vacations: County Institute, October 17 and 18; Thanksgiving, November 24 and 25; Christmas, December 22 to January 2, inclusive; Spring Vacation, the week of April 3; Memorial Day, May 30; classes closing for children on Wednesday, June 14.

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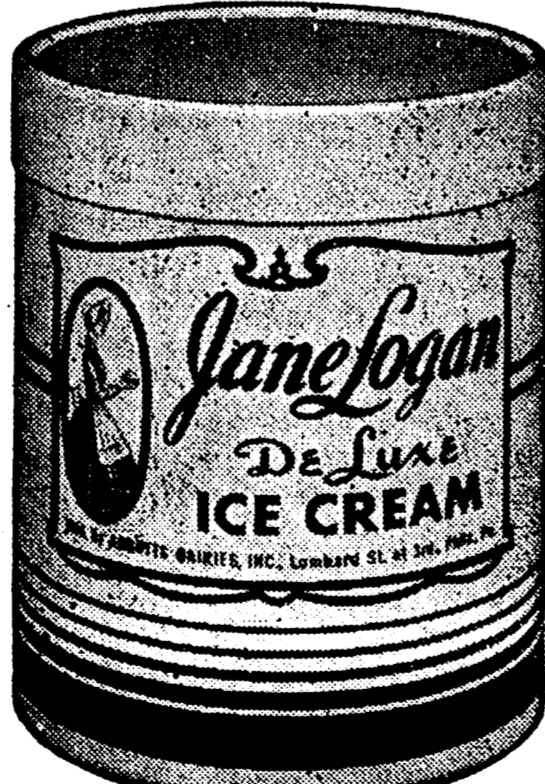
