ment of Ordinance No. 520 fixing the Borough rate of taxation for the year 1950;
NOW, THEREFORE, said Ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:
Section 1. That for the year 1950 a tax be and the same is hereby levied on all properties, offices, professions, occupations and persons, subject to taxation for Borough purposes, at the rate of Fifteen (15) mills on each dollar of the valuation of same as assessed for County purposes.

Section 2. The tax above levied shall be apportioned to and among the following

each dollar of assessed valuation.

(b) For aiding in the maintenance of the Free Library a tax at the late on the One and one-quarter (1½) mills on each dollar of assessed valuation.

(c) For debt purposes and payments into the Sinking Fund a tax at the rate of Three-quarters (½) mills on each dollar of assessed valuation, making a total rate of Borough tax for the foregoing purposes of Fifteen (15) mills on each dollar of assessed valuation, as aforesaid.

Section 3. Upon the present Ordinance becoming effective, Ordinance No. 520 approved March 6, 1950, shall be deemed to be amended and supplemented by this Ordinance, and the proper Borough officers are hereby authorized and directed to make such amendments and changes in the Borough budget for 1950 and to take such action as may be necessary to give effect to this amending Ordinance.



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

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
With the close of the collection for the service campaign in the elementary schools, the Swarthmore Schools United Charities Drive for the year is being ended. May I take this opportunity to refer you to Mr. F. T. Flaherty's letter of March 30, a copy of which appears in The Swarthmorean of April 7. I heartily agree with the sentiments expressed

The question which I asked my good friend, George Ewing, at the Town Meeting on March 29, was not answered. Perhaps he did not understand the question which had nothing whatever to do with plans A, B, or C.

I want to know if Council or Mr. Ewing has explored the possibility of removing the wood shingled rear portion of the Borough Hall and extending the entire building back to the property line on Lafayette Avenue? This would add considerably to the size of the building.

I find myself cold to the proposal to purchase the Kistler lot at a cost of \$37,500. If the Borough Hall were reduced to a twostory structure as nicely pictured by Mr. Ewing, enlarged as I have suggested, and the interior rearranged, there would be ample space for the Fire Department on the Dartmouth avenue level and for the Police Department, the Borough Secretary and the Health Center on the first floor. The second floor would provide ample space for a Council Chamber, Offices, and increased space for the Legion, with plenty of room

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
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

Budget For 1950-51 Also Adopted By Board Wednesday

At Wednesday evening's session the Swarthmore School Board adopted a budget totaling \$331,600 for the school year 1950-51, and maintained the tax rate at its present 35 mills. The new budget is \$11,000 higher than last year's. the income increase being from expected higher tuition returns, additional assessments on new houses, and a larger balance carried over from this year. The amount is alloted to cover increased salaries of teachers as mandated by the new state law. and various increases in operational cost rates. Of the entire budget figure \$212,000 is for instructional purposes.

The board authorized the organization of the usual summer school classes from June 19 to July 28 under the direction of G. Baker Thompson. Mr. Thompson's resignation this summer as high school principal, a position he has held since 1941, was accepted with regret. The board wished him much success in his hew appointment as assistant county superintendent.



Feather-bedding scheme of Firemen's Union to put an additional fireman on diesel locomotives has been

Fact Finding Boards appointed by Presidents Roosevelt and Truman have said these demands were "devoid of merit" and they were

Now the Firemen's leaders seek to paralyze railroad transportation to compel the railroads to employ a wholly unnecessary additional fireman to ride on diesel locomotives. This scheme is plain

# FFATH FR-RF

LEADERS OF the Firemen's union have called a nationwide strike starting with four great railroads on April 26. These railroads are the New York Central, Pennsylvania, Santa Fe, and Southern.

The union claim that a second fireman is needed on grounds of safety is sheer hypocrisy. Safety has been dragged into this dispute only in an unsuccessful effort to give a cloak of respectability to vicious feather-bedding demands.

After a careful study of the first demands of this union, a Presidential Fact Finding Board on May 21, 1943, reported to President Roosevelt that there was no need for an extra fireman on diesel

Again, on September 19, 1949, after a second hearing on the union leaders' demands, a second Board reported to President Truman that: "there presently exists no need for an additional fireman . . . upon either the ground of safety or that of efficiency and economy of operation."

> Safety Record of Diesels is Outstandingly Good

Although the railroads accepted the Board findings, the union leaders have brazenly rejected them. They represent that an

extra fireman is needed for "safety" reasons. Here's what the Board had to say on that point:

"The safety and on-time performance of diesel electric locomotives operated under current rules have been notably

"Upon careful analysis of the data submitted on safety, we have concluded that no valid reasons have been shown as a support for the Brotherhood proposal under which a fireman would be required to be at all times continuously in the cab of road diesels. The proposal must be rejected."

The real reason behind these demands is that the union leaders are trying to make jobs where there is no work. In other words, a plain case of "feather-bedding." The railroads have no intention of yielding to these wasteful make-work demands. "The Safety Record of Diesels is Outstandingly Good ..."



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

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
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
